the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (Matthew 2:1–12). the festival commemorating the Epiphany on January 6: "many submerge themselves in ice water to celebrate Epiphany" a manifestation of a divine or supernatural being: "many believe this scene to represent an epiphany of the goddess" a moment of sudden revelation or insight: "a few years ago, I had an epiphany"

Charles Knippel writes in *The Lutheran Witness Magazine*, "Epiphany has a remarkable "epiphanizing" splendor all of its own. Actually, it has more than one splendor. It has *splendors* like a brilliant diamond with many facets, each facet of Epiphany has its own unique splendor, and, like a diamond crafted with all its facets, it is a jewel of radiant beauty. ... And by God's power, the Good News of God actually "epiphanizes" us."

A familiar text from the Old Testament prophet, Isaiah, sets the tone: "Arise, shine for your light has come and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you" (Is. 60:1). At Christmas, we emphasize that God became man in the flesh. Epiphany changes the emphasis to the baby born in Bethlehem is also fully God. This concept that Jesus is the true light of life (John 8:12) is one of the reasons that Epiphany is also called the Festival of Lights.

Epiphany is also associated with Jesus' baptism by John when the trinity was present: Jesus was baptized, Holy Spirit descended on Him in bodily form like a dove, and the Father's voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son: with you I am well pleased'" (Mark 3:21-22). In the Eastern Orthodox Church, this is also known as a Theophany.

Some hymns for Epiphany are: "Angels from the Realms of Glory" (ELW275), "Be Thou My Vision" (ELW793), "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light" (ELW 815), "The First Noel" (ELW300), "Word of God Come Down on Earth" (ELW510), "Midnight Stars Make Bright the Skies" (ELW 280).

Knippel suggested: 1) Share the splendor of Epiphany as God did by the guiding star; worship Jesus with precious gifts; 2) Draw on your baptism for comfort, confidence and courage; 3) Use your newness of life to care for others; 4) Let the words of your mouth and the meditation of your heart be acceptable to the Lord; 5) Build up the Church; 6) Live a life of love described by St. Paul; 7) Live the "blessed" life taught by Jesus; 8) Listen to Him.

PROGRAM FOR SENIORS

If you're struggling with money in retirement, there are a few programs and services you can consider. These programs can help with food, medical bills and employment.

The Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP):

Provides benefits to low-income Americans to supplement their grocery budget. You have to qualify according to your income and assets. A household with an elderly or disabled person has to meet only the net income limit, which is gross income minus allowable deductions. September 30, 2023, is \$1,215 for a household of one or \$1,644 for a household of two.

If you're eligible, you will receive SNAP benefits on an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card, which works like a debit card. Benefits are automatically loaded into your account each month. You can then use your EBT card to buy groceries at authorized food stores and retailers.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program:

The U.S. Department of Agriculture runs the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP). Certain low-income people over the age of 60 are eligible for a monthly food package containing vegetables, fruits, cheeses, grains, protein, milk and more.

Medicare Savings Program:

Medicare Savings Programs can help pay your Medicare Part A and B premiums, deductibles, coinsurance and copayments to eligible recipients. You apply for Medicare Savings Programs through your state, and your state will determine which program or programs you quality for.

To qualify, you must have income and resources below a specific limit. There are four Medicare Savings Programs: The Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) Program, the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB) Program, the Qualifying Individual (QI) Program and the Qualified Disabled and Working Individual (QDWI) Program.

Senior Community Service Employment Program:

If you're struggling with money in retirement and are not disabled, you may be able to work part time. If the cuts have impacted you, part-time work can help supplement your Social Security income. The U.S. Department of Labor runs the Senior Community Service Employment Program. It helps subsidize part-time employment and training in community service positions so older workers can move to unsubsidized, private-sector jobs.
