Getting It

“The angel said to the women, “Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here, for he has risen, just as He said” Matt 12:5-6 NIV

The first Easter began very inauspiciously for those who had experienced the events of the previous week. The followers of Jesus were hiding behind locked doors. The women went to the tomb, looking for a dead body to anoint. They were mainly concerned about finding someone to roll away the stone that sealed the tomb. They were going to mourn, anoint, mourn, go home, mourn.

There was one person, however (besides Jesus, himself) who totally “got it”. That person was the redeemed thief who had been crucified with Jesus. On that first Easter morning, he was filled with utter joy, with total certainty, and who had absolutely no doubt or lack of understanding. He was celebrating Christ’s resurrection in Heaven! A man who had not been baptized, who had not given a tithe, who had broken the law, did not do any recorded acts of kindness, who had never walked with the disciples nor had ever seen Jesus work even one miracle, found not irony, but grace. He simply, with his last breath, had cried out for mercy, confessed, acknowledging Jesus as His redeemer, and was rewarded by being in Paradise on that very day. It was for that purpose that Jesus sacrificed himself in complete and perfect love. For the thief, this was undoubtedly the best Easter ever!

Make no mistake. It took all of Jesus’ followers a bit longer to “get it”, but as they heard the news from the women who hurried back from the tomb with the message that it was empty and that Jesus had risen, when they actually saw and spoke with Jesus, as He gave them the commission to “go and teach all nations” their lives were never the same again. They were infused with the Holy Spirit, inspired, energized, and compelled to go and tell. They were empowered to take the good news to not only the Jews, but to the gentiles, to suffer greatly and to die under persecution. But once they “got it”, all this became their purpose, their joy, the expression of gratitude and love for the Savior who had secured their salvation.

CHRIST WITH US (Con't.)

Now, what about you? What about me? We look to the thief who recognized his sin, confessed, repented and who proclaimed Christ his King. We also look to the followers of Jesus. We look to those who, in faith and love, found that they were compelled by that love to share the good news, to be of service, to sacrifice much because Jesus sacrificed himself. Are we living like Jesus died and rose again? Or are we living like it doesn't really matter how we move in the world; salvation's secured. "I'm fine, thanks!" We are all called to ministry. We all have talents that can be used to glorify God. Are we eager to share the good news with our neighbors? Do we joyfully put our hands to tasks that may be uncomfortable or even arduous? Do we strive to include those people who are normally marginalized? Do we recognize and reach out to the least, the last and the lonely? Are we generously and joyfully giving? These are things we are moved to do out of love and gratitude because through Christ's suffering and death, we are no longer our own, but belong to Him. We don't "Get It" unless we "Live It"! "Getting it" means understanding that unlike the thief on the cross, we have been granted a longer life to worship, to glorify, to obey, to love and to let God use us as His own beloved children, to walk with Jesus, bringing new life and hope to every person. That's truly "Getting It".

Heavenly Father, thank you for your grace and mercy. Show me how to use my gifts and talents in worship, praise and gratitude. Amen



MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JACK

The Other Side

In Matthew 16:5-12 Jesus warns his disciples of the leaven of the Pharisees as they venture to the other side. Jesus warns them of the leaven that the Pharisees and Sadducees that focuses on elevating certain Scriptures to prove their points. While serving a congregation in Illinois a well-meaning advocate of a Christian cult rang my doorbell on Saturday morning. His presentation was scripted and well-rehearsed. He quoted Scripture to prove his point. I quietly moved him beyond his verses to assist him in viewing the verses from the script to see that the scriptures beyond his scope changed the meaning. How easy to be persuaded by a few verses instead of the context. Jesus challenges his disciples to see through the leaven and visible doctrine of the Pharisees to discover the truth. We can easily prove our point via Scriptures taken out of context or combined with other scriptures to prove our point. The Pharisees and religious leaders of Jesus' time were moved by the law and prophets. Jesus asked the question: "Where is love of God and man in the voice today?" Jesus took them to the other side.



CHRIST IS RISEN! He is risen indeed!

The first Sunday in April is Easter Sunday, and you will hear the great promise fulfilled: Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Without that truth, we have no hope, we would be dead in our sin and literally bound to our own destruction. But we have not only the witness of the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John), but there are over 500 witnesses who saw Jesus after his resurrection. We have the testimony of Saul, who was confronted by the Risen Savior on the road to Damascus and who became St. Paul, the great teacher and founder of the early church. And finally, we have our own calling and conviction through the power of the Holy Spirit, through baptism, the hearing of the Word, and through partaking of the instituted Holy Supper, the Body and Blood of Christ.

Those early disciples turned the world upside down. They were anointed by and with the Holy Spirit and preached, baptized, organized, encouraged, faced torture, hunger, imprisonment, and every manner of deprivation because the Living Savior had changed their lives. They willingly faced persecution and death for the sake of the Gospel.

So when we proclaim, “Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!” how does that impact our living? Do we actually live as if Christ suffered and died for our sins and rose again, or are we content to live complacent lives of satisfied inertia! Do we live lives that proclaim our belief, our dedication to our Savior; can others see Jesus in us? Do we love and care for our neighbors? Do we speak up for justice, defend the poor and the helpless, do we support those organizations that care for the homeless, the hungry, those who are marginalized? Are we using our time, our talents, and our abilities in Christ’s service? What are we contributing to the good of the whole? Are we open-handed and generous with our resources, our time, and our money? Do we live in recognition that we are not our own, but all that we are and all that we have belongs to our living Savior? It is not enough to proclaim the resurrection; our love and gratitude, we need to live the resurrection. We need to step into the promise that motivates our participation in what God has placed us here to do. Be of service, give generously, proclaim the good news!

We know that after Easter, many of our “winter disciples” will be returning to their summer residences. For those of us who remain throughout the summer, your presence enriches us. We rejoice in the fellowship we have together, and we don’t feel “whole” until you return. We love you, and you will be missed. Safe journey, and please keep Gloria de Cristo in your prayers, and we will most certainly be praying for all of you as well. And together, as one body of believers, we will proclaim Christ’s resurrection through our living testimony until He returns.

“Christ is risen!”

“He is risen indeed, hallelujah!”

And so goes our Easter greetings to each other. What a wonderful salvation we have through the life, death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ! We affirm as much in the Apostles’ Creed during the month of April.

I have been reading *What’s a Christian, Anyway?* by Glenn Packiam. It is based on the Nicene Creed, which we recited in March. The following is an excerpt from his book.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

What does it mean to believe these words?

It means knowing that Jesus came for us and that God is for you.

It means believing that this salvation—the putting back together of the world, of all that sin pulled apart—is for you.

It means that from the highest to the lowest, from the powerful to the powerless, there is no one outside the reach of God’s salvation. Jesus went to the very bottom and made a way out.

What does it mean to live by these words?

It means admitting that we need help.

It means recognizing that we have sinned, that we have failed to live up to our calling by the things we have done and by the things we have left undone.

It means confessing that we are under a power, like a virus that has weakened us, and we desperately need the cure.

As great as we might think we are, as lousy as we might feel, we are all on level ground. No human can save himself. There is freedom in realizing it, in running into a wall and knowing that you have come to the end of yourself. Only God can save us. Thank God for Jesus.

If some of these words resonate with you, you can obtain the little book from Amazon. I purchased it as a Kindle Book (e-book) very reasonably. He takes each small section of the Creed through a very clear and readable, scripture-referenced explanation and shows its application to today's humanity.

Our first January meeting was spent packing our completed items to transport to Lord of Life Lutheran church in Sun City West. There the items are packed into travel bags for distribution to many third-world countries. In each travel bag are hotel-sized soap, 2 washcloths, a washable carry bag, two shields and eight liners which comprise a complete feminine hygiene kit.

Gloria de Cristo Days for Girls transported the following items in 14 boxes and bags:

Soap: 167 Washcloths: 415 Carry bags: 207 Travel bags: 182
Shields: 294 Liners: 1,594

The next distribution trip is planned for March, 2026, to Costa Rica and Panama. As for our Gloria de Cristo group, we will start again sewing, ironing, tracing, cutting and enjoying being together. An anonymous donor gave a sizeable gift which will allow sewing machine maintenance, purchase of flannels and cottons plus notions. What a Blessing your support is.
